Proven Health Care Cost Reduction Through Strength in Numbers

LEGAL DEVELOPMENTS LEAD AT ANNUAL EDUCATION SESSION

wo presentations at the Coalition's September 22, 2022, annual education session emphasized how laws and judicial decisions impact the delivery of health care services.

Legislation Proposed Regarding Dialysis Cost Containment Services

The recent victory at the U.S. Supreme Court in *DaVita v Marietta Memorial Hospital* (see the PHC newsletter, Issue 3, 2022) is not the last word in protecting the ability of health plans to contain the cost of dialysis services incurred by their individual members.

"DaVita was prepared for this decision and acted quickly to influence lawmakers to introduce legislation, H.R. 8594 and SB 4750. the Restore Protections for Dialysis Patients Act, which would curtail the ability of plans to apply Usual and Reasonable cutbacks to outpatient dialysis billed charges," explained Mary Stoll, attorney with the Stoll Law Group. "The legislation would increase dialysis costs and remove the flexibility for private-sector health plans to pay for these lifesaving treatments, while keeping health care costs low for both dialysis patients and non-dialysis patients covered under the plan."

At the meeting, the Coalition Board decided to provide participating plans with materials to engage with their legislators on this topic. "This is a complicated issue," said Pat Shier, Alaska membership representative. "Look for a longer article in the first 2023 issue of this newsletter that lays out what is at stake and how member plans can help influence the fate of this proposed law."

PBM Plans at Risk?

Tonia Sorrell-Neal, senior director, State Affairs, for the **Pharmaceutical** Care Management Association (PCMA) spoke about the PCMA's lobbying efforts to prevent the pharma industry from undermining pharmacy benefit management (PBM) plans based on a 2020 U.S. Supreme Court decision. In Rutledge v. PCMA, the court ruled that ERISA (Employee Retirement Income Security Act) does not preempt an Arkansas law regulating PBM reimbursement to pharmacies. The decision offers a potential avenue for states to increase regulation of PBMs and other service providers that help administer ERISA-regulated group health plans.

Sorrell-Neal, who has more than 15 years of experience as a Taft-

Hartley plan trustee, emphasized the importance of lobbying efforts, in particular among Taft-Hartley plans, noting that legislators and regulators need to hear a broad range of voices. Recently, PCMA President and CEO JC Scott participated at a "listening forum" at the Federal Trade Commission on competition in the health care industry, where he urged broadening "the scope of a study to look at the entire prescription drug supply-and-payment chain holistically." In Other News

- The Coalition is close to reaching an agreement with a dental plan PPO provider. Look for an announcement of that new service early in 2023.
- In yet another example of "health care cost reduction through strength in numbers", an increase in the number of member plans using the PHC's vision care program through VSP has allowed the Coalition to pass into a lower administrative tier, reducing charges by a further 0.5%.
